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Chapter

System Board

1.1 Features

This high-performance system board is built on an ATX baseboard utilizing an Intel Pentium[®] P54C/P55C processor running at 75 MHz to 233 MHz, Cyrix 6x86/6x86MX, and AMD K5/K6. It has four PCI and three ISA slots (with one PCI- and ISA-shared slot) for future expansion. The onboard three DIMMs sockets allow memory upgrade to a maximum of 256 MB. To further enhance system performance, the board also comes with 256-MB/512-MB pipelined-burst second-level cache.

Onboard I/O interfaces comprise of an UART NS16C550 serial port, a parallel port with Enhanced Parallel Port (EPP)/Extended Capabilities Port (ECP) feature, PS/2 keyboard and mouse ports, and a Universal Serial Bus (USB) interface. The USB interface allows the system to support additional peripherals.

The system supports the power-management function that conforms to the power-saving standards of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Energy Star program. It also offers the Plug-and-Play feature. This feature saves the user from configuration troubles, thus making the system more user-friendly.

The system is fully compatible with MS-DOS V6.X, OS/2, UNIX, Windows NT and Windows 95 operating systems.


1.2 System Board Layout

The system board has the following features and components:

- A ZIF (zero insertion force) socket that supports Intel Pentium CPU P54C/P55C processor (75MHz~233MHz), Cyrix 6x86/6x86MX, and AMD K5/K6.
- 256-MB maximum system memory
- Three DIMM sockets that accept 16-, 32-, 64- and 128-MB DIMMs
- 256-KB/512-KB pipelined-burst second-level cache
- Integrates an enhanced PCI local bus IDE controller
- PCI 2.1 compliant
- 2 MBit Flash ROM for system BIOS
- Four PCI- and three ISA-expansion slots (one PCI- and ISAshared slot)
- Dual NS16C550 buffered serial ports and one ECP/EPP parallel port
- USB interface that enables the system to support more peripherals
- Two fast IDE channels support Ultra 33 Synchronous DMA mode and PIO mode 4
- IrDA Interface reserved
- PS/2 mouse and keyboard interface
- Power-management function

1.3 ESD Precautions

Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can damage your processor, disk drives, expansion boards, and other components. Always observe the following precautions before you install a system component.

- 1. Do not remove a component from its protective packaging until you are ready to install it.
- 2. Wear a wrist grounding strap and attach it to a metal part of the system unit before handling components. If a wrist strap is not available, maintain contact with the system unit throughout any procedure requiring ESD protection.

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1.4 **Pre-installation Instructions**

Always observe the following before you install a system component:

- 1. Turn off the system power and all the peripherals connected to the unit before opening it.
- 2. Open the system according to the instructions in the housing installation manual.
- 3. Follow the ESD precautions in section 1.3 before handling a system component.
- 4. Remove any expansion boards or peripherals that block access to the DIMM sockets or CPU socket.
- 5. See the following sections for specific instructions on the component you wish to install.



Do not attempt the procedures described in the following sections unless you are a qualified service technician.

1.5 Upgrading the CPU

1.5.1 Removing the CPU

In case you want to replace or upgrade your CPU, you need to remove the previously installed CPU first.

Follow these steps to remove the CPU:

- 1. Locate the CPU socket with CPU mounted on the system board.
- 2. Detach the fan cable connector.
- 3. Pull up the socket lever. The CPU pins will be automatically released from the socket holes.
- 4. Detach the CPU from the socket.

1.5.2 Installing the Upgrade CPU



Observe the ESD precautions when installing components. See section 1.3.

Before you proceed, make sure that there is no CPU installed in the CPU socket.

Follow these steps to install the upgrade CPU:

- 1. Pull up the socket lever.
- 2. Insert the CPU, making sure that pin 1 (indicated by a notched corner) of the CPU connects to hole 1 of the socket.
- 3. Pull down the socket lever to lock the CPU into the socket.

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


Figure 1-2 Installing a CPU

4. Attach the heatsink and fan to the CPU.





Figure 1-3 Attaching the Heatsink and Fan to the CPU

5. Plug in the fan cable to the fan connector on the system board.

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1.7 Installing Memory

The system memory is expandable to 256 MB by adding DIMMs (Dual In-line Memory Modules). See Figure 1-1 for the location of the DIMM sockets. Section 1.7.1 tells how to install DIMMs.

The first two 168-pin DIMM sockets on the system board accept 16-, 32-, 64- and 128-MB DIMMs, with 16 MBit and 64 MBit SDRAM technology support. DIMM3 (Single Side) can only accept 16MB and 64MB DIMMs. Table 1-5 lists the possible memory configurations.




The DIMM modules on DIMM1 and DIMM2 sockets are exchangeable. Only 16MB and 64MB DIMMs can be use on DIMM3 (Single Side).

1.7.1 Installing a DIMM

Follow these steps to install a DIMM:

- 1. Align pin 1 of the DIMM with pin 1 of the socket. Pin 1 is labeled 1 on both of the DIMM and the socket.
- 2. Gently push the DIMM until the holding clips lock the DIMM into a vertical position.

Be careful when inserting DIMMs. Forcing a DIMM in or out of a socket can damage the socket or the DIMM (or both).

1.7.2 Removing a DIMM

To remove a DIMM:

- 1. Press the holding clips on both sides of the socket outward to release the DIMM.
- 2. Gently pull the DIMM out of the socket.




Figure 1-6 Removing a DIMM

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1.7.3 Reconfiguring the System

The system automatically detects the amount of memory installed. Run Setup to view the new value for total system memory and make a note of it.

1.8 Second-level Cache

The board may come with either 256 or 512-KB pipelined-burst second-level cache. Refer to the following table for the possible cache configurations.

1.9 Installing Expansion Cards

1.9.1 Installing the PCI Card

To install PCI cards:

- 1. Locate the PCI slot(s) on the mainboard.
- 2. Remove the bracket on the housing opposite to the empty PCI slot.
- 3. Insert a PCI card into the slot. Make sure that the card is properly seated.
- 4. Secure the card to the housing with a screw.

When you turn on the system, BIOS automatically detects and assigns resources to the PCI devices.




Figure 1-7 Installing a PCI Card

1.9.2 Installing the ISA Cards

Both PnP and non-PnP ISA cards require specific IRQs. When installing ISA cards, make sure that the IRQs required by these cards are not previously assigned to PCI devices to avoid resource conflicts.

Follow these steps when installing ISA cards:

- 1. Remove all PnP cards installed in the system, if any.
- 2. Install non-PnP ISA cards.
- 3. Turn on the system.
- 4. Use Windows 95 or ICU to manually assign the appropriate IRQs to the cards. This ensures that BIOS will not use the resources assigned to the non-PnP ISA cards.



BIOS detects and configures only PnP cards.

- 5. Turn off the system.
- 6. Locate the expansion slots and install the PnP ISA and PCI cards.
- 7. Turn on the system. This time PnP BIOS automatically configures the PnP ISA and PCI cards with the available resources.




Figure 1-8 Installing an ISA Card

1.10 Post-installation Instructions

Observe the following after installing a system component:

- 1. See to it that the components are installed according to the stepby-step instructions in their respective sections.
- 2. Make sure you have set all the required jumpers. See section 1.6 for the correct jumper settings.
- 3. Replace any expansion boards or peripherals that you removed earlier.
- 4. Replace the system cover.
- 5. Connect the necessary cables and turn on the system.

1.11 USB

USB is a new serial bus design that is capable of cascading low-/medium-speed peripherals (less than 12Mbps) such as keyboard, mouse, joystick, scanner, printer and modem/ISDN. With USB, complex cable connections at the back panel of your PC can be eliminated.

See Figure 1-1 for the location of the USB interface on the system board.

1.12 Hardware Monitor Function

The Hardware Monitor function of the system board allows you to check the system resources, either locally or in a computer network, via software such as ADM (Advanced Desktop Management) or Intel LDCM (LAN Desk Client Manager)). ADM and Intel LDCM are desktop management programs that offer SMART (System Monitoring Analysis and Reporting Technology) monitor function for checking local or network connected systems. In addition, it also enables the PC products and applications to be OS independent.

To enable the Hardware Monitor function, you need to install either ADM or Intel LDCM. Contact your dealer for information on the availability of the software. Refer to the software documentation for more details on the Hardware Monitor function.

1.13 Error Messages

In the event that you receive an error message, do not continue using the computer. Note the message and take corrective action immediately. This section describes the different types of error messages and suggests corrective measures.

There are two general types of error messages:

- Software
- System

1.13.1 Software Error Messages

Software error messages are returned by your operating system or application. These messages typically appear after you boot the operating system or when you run your applications. If you receive this type of message, consult your application or operating system manual for help.

1.13.2 System Error Messages

A system error message indicates a problem with the computer itself. These messages normally appear during the power-on self-test, before the operating system prompt appears. Table 1-7 lists the system error messages in alphabetical order..

1.13.3 Correcting Error Conditions

As a general rule, the "Press F1 to continue" error message is caused by a configuration problem which can be easily corrected. An equipment malfunction is more likely to cause a fatal error, i.e., an error that causes complete system failure.

Here are some corrective measures for error conditions:

- Run Setup. You must know the correct configuration values for your system before you enter Setup, which is why you should write these values down when the system is correctly configured. An incorrect Setup configuration is a major cause of power-on error messages, especially for a new system.
- 2. Remove the system cover according to the directions in the system housing installation guide. Check that the system board and any expansion boards are set correctly.
- If you cannot access a new disk, it may be because your disk is not physically formatted. Physically format the disk using the FDISK and FORMAT commands.
- 4. Check that all connectors and boards are secure. Consult the system housing installation guide for assistance.

If you follow the corrective steps above and still receive an error message, the cause may be an equipment malfunction.

If you are sure that your configuration values are correct and your battery is in good condition, the problem may lie in a damaged or defective chip. Contact an authorized service center for assistance.

Most systems are already configured by the manufacturer or the dealer. There is no need to run Setup when starting the computer unless you get a Run Setup message.

The Setup program loads configuration values into the battery-backed nonvolatile memory called CMOS RAM. This memory area is not part of the system RAM.



If you repeatedly receive Run Setup messages, the battery may be bad. In this case, the system cannot retain configuration values in CMOS. Ask a qualified technician for assistance.

Before you run Setup, make sure that you have saved all open files. The system reboots immediately after you exit Setup.

2.1 Entering Setup

To enter Setup, press the key combination CTRL + ALT + ESC.



You must press <u>CTRL</u>+<u>ALT</u>+<u>ESC</u> while the system is booting. This key combination does not work during any other time.

The following sections explain the parameters.

2.2.1 Processor

The Processor parameter specifies the type of processor currently installed in your system. The system supports Intel Pentium, AMD and Cyrix processors.

2.2.2 Processor Speed

The Processor Speed parameter specifies the speed of the processor currently installed in your system. The system can support Pentium processors running at 166, 200, and 233 MHz.

2.2.3 L1 Cache Size

This parameter specifies the first-level or the internal memory (i.e., the memory integrated into the CPU) size, and whether it is enabled or disabled. For information on how to configure the system memory, see section 2.6.1.

2.2.4 L2 Cache Size

This parameter specifies the second-level cache memory size currently supported by the system. The available cache sizes are 256 KB or 512 KB (manufacturing setting). The board may also come without L2 cache. For information on how to configure the system memory, see section 2.6.2

2.2.5 Floppy Drive A

This parameter specifies the system's current floppy drive A settings. For information on how to configure the floppy drives, see section 2.3.2.

2.2.6 Floppy Drive B

This parameter specifies the system's current floppy drive B settings. For information on how to configure the floppy drives, see section 2.3.2.

2.2.7 IDE Primary Channel Master

This parameter specifies the current configuration of the IDE device connected to the master port of the primary IDE channel. For information on how to configure the IDE devices drives, see section 2.3.4.

2.2.8 IDE Primary Channel Slave

This parameter specifies the current configuration of the IDE device connected to the slave port of the primary IDE channel. For information on how to configure the IDE devices drives, see section 2.3.4.

2.2.9 IDE Secondary Channel Master

This parameter specifies the current configuration of the IDE device connected to the master port of the secondary IDE channel. For information on how to configure the IDE devices drives, see section 2.3.4.

2.2.10 IDE Secondary Channel Slave

This parameter specifies the current configuration of the IDE device connected to the slave port of the secondary IDE channel. For information on how to configure the IDE devices drives, see section 2.3.4.

2.2.11 Total Memory

This parameter specifies the total amount of onboard memory. The memory size is automatically detected by BIOS during the POST. If you install additional memory, the system automatically adjusts this parameter to display the new memory size.

1st Bank/2nd Bank/3rd Bank

The 1st Bank, 2nd Bank, and 3rd Bank parameters indicate the type of DRAM installed in DIMM sockets 1, 2, and 3. The None setting indicates that there is no DRAM installed. For the location of the DIMM sockets, refer to Figure 1-1.

2.2.12 Serial Port 1

This parameter shows the serial port 1 address and IRQ settings.

2.2.13 Serial Port 2

This parameter shows the serial port 2 address and IRQ settings.

2.2.14 Parallel Port

This parameter shows the parallel port address and IRQ settings.

2.2.15 PS/2 Mouse

The BIOS utility automatically detects if there is a mouse connected to your system. If there is, this parameter displays the Installed setting. Otherwise, this is set to None.

2.2.16 USB Host Controller

This parameter specifies whether the onboard USB controller is enabled or disabled. For information on how to enable or disable USB, see section 2.6.7.

2.2.17 **Product Information**

The Product Information contains the general data about the system, such as the product name, serial number, BIOS version, etc. These information are necessary for troubleshooting (may be required when asking for technical support).

2.3 Basic Configuration

Select Basic Configuration to input configuration values such as date, time, and disk types.

The following screen shows the Basic Configuration menu.

2.3.1 Date and Time

The real-time clock keeps the system date and time. After setting the date and time, you do not need to enter them every time you turn on the system. As long as the internal battery remains good (approximately seven years) and connected, the clock continues to keep the date and time accurately even when the power is off.

Highlight the items on the Date parameter and press \rightarrow or \leftarrow to set the date following the month-day-year format.

2.3.2 Floppy Drives

To enter the configuration value for the first floppy drive (drive A), highlight the Floppy Drive A parameter. Press \frown or \frown key to view the options and select the appropriate value.

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Follow the same procedure to configure floppy drive B. Choose None if you do not have a second floppy drive.

2.3.3 LS-120 Drive As

This parameter allows you not only to enable the LS-120 device installed in your system, but as well as specify the function of the device. The setting affects how BIOS will detect the device.

Possible settings are:

- Normal In this setting, BIOS does not support the LS-120 drive. The drive needs the LS-120 device driver to operate.
- Drive A BIOS recognizes the LS-120 drive as drive A. If a standard diskette drive A exists, BIOS automatically identifies it as drive B. If a standard diskette drive B exists, it automatically becomes inaccessible.

If two LS-120 drives exist, BIOS recognizes them as drive A and drive B, respectively..

- Drive B BIOS recognizes the LS-120 drive as drive B. If a standard diskette drive B exists, it becomes inaccessible.
- Hard Disk BIOS recognizes the LS-120 drive as a hard disk. In this setting, format the LS-120 drive as any other hard disk and assign it a drive letter C, D, E, and so on. See the documentation that came with the LS-120 drive for more information.

2.3.4 IDE Drives

To configure the IDE drives connected to your system, select the parameter that represents the channel and port where the desired hard disk to configure is connected. The options are:

IDE Primary Channel Master

This parameter lets you configure the hard disk drive connected to the master port of IDE channel 1.

This parameter lets you configure the hard disk drive connected to the slave port of IDE channel 1.

<u>TYPE</u>

This parameter lets you specify the type of hard disk installed in your system. If you want BIOS to automatically configure your hard disk, select Auto. If you know your hard disk type, you can enter the setting manually.

Setting this parameter also sets the Cylinder, Head, Sector, and Size parameters.

CYLINDERS

This parameter specifies the number of cylinders of your hard disk, and is automatically set depending on your Type parameter setting.

<u>HEAD</u>

This parameter specifies the number of heads of your hard disk, and is automatically set depending on your Type parameter setting.

SECTORS

This parameter specifies the number of sectors of your hard disk, and is automatically set depending on your Type parameter setting.

<u>SIZE</u>

This parameter specifies the size of your hard disk, in MB.

Enhanced IDE Features

HARD DISK SIZE > 504 MB

When set to Auto, the BIOS utility automatically detects if the installed hard disk supports the function. If supported, it allows you to use a hard disk with a capacity of more than 504 MB. This is made possible through the Logical Block Address (LBA) mode translation. However, enhanced IDE feature works only under DOS and Windows 3.x, 95 environment. Other operating systems require this parameter to be set to Disabled.

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HARD DISK BLOCK MODE

This function enhances disk performance depending on the hard disk in use. If you set this parameter to Auto, the BIOS utility automatically detects if the installed hard disk drive supports the Block Mode function. If supported, it allows data transfer in block (multiple sectors) at a rate of 256 bytes per cycle. To disregard the feature, change the setting to Disabled.

ADVANCED PIO MODE

When set to Auto, the BIOS utility automatically detects if the installed hard disk supports the function. If supported, it allows for faster data recovery and read/write timing that reduces hard disk activity time. This results to better hard disk performance. To disregard the feature, change the setting to Disabled.

HARD DISK 32-BIT ACCESS

Enabling this parameter improves system performance by allowing the use of the 32-bit hard disk access. This enhanced IDE feature works only under DOS, Windows 3.x, Windows 95, and Novell NetWare. If your software or hard disk does not support this function, set this parameter to Disabled.

DMA TRANSFER MODE

The Ultra DMA and Multi-DMA modes enhances hard disk performance by increasing the transfer rate. However, besides enabling these features in the BIOS Setup, both Ultra DMA and Multi-DMA modes require the DMA driver to be loaded. By setting this parameter to Auto, BIOS automatically sets the appropriate DMA mode for your hard disk.


CD-ROM DRIVE DMA MODE

Set this parameter to Enabled to enable the DMA mode for the CD-ROM drive. This improves the system performance since it allows direct memory access to the CD-ROM. To deactivate the function, set the parameter to Disabled.

2.3.5 Boot Options

This option allows you to specify your preferred setting for bootup.

The following screen appears if you select Boot Options from the Basic Configuration menu:



Fast Boot

This parameter allows the system to boot faster by skipping some POST routines. The default setting is Auto.

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Silent Boot

This parameter enables or disables the Silent Boot function. When set to Enabled, BIOS is in graphical mode and displays only an identification logo during POST and while booting. After which the screen displays the operating system prompt (such as DOS) or logo (such as Windows 95). If any error occurred while booting, the system automatically switches to the text mode.

Even if your setting is Enabled, you may also switch to the text mode while booting by pressing F³ after you hear a beep that indicates the activation of the keyboard.

When set to Disabled, BIOS is in the conventional text mode where you see the system initialization details on the screen.

Num Lock After Boot

This parameter allows you to activate the Num Lock function upon booting. The default setting is Enabled.

Memory Test

When set to Enabled, this parameter allows the system to perform a RAM test during the POST routine. When set to Disabled, the system detects only the memory size and bypasses the test routine. The default setting is Disabled.

Boot Sequence

This parameter allows you to specify the boot search sequence during POST.

- 1st. The system checks this drive first.
- 2nd. The system then check this drive if it can not boot from the 1st specified drive.
- 3^{rd} . If 1^{st} and 2^{rd} search failed then boot from this drive.

BIOS Utility

The BIOS will display an error message if the drive(s) specified is not bootable.

First Hard Disk Drive

If you have a SCSI drive installed, setting this parameter to SCSI allow the system to initialize the SCSI drive before the IDE drive. When set to IDE, the system will initialize the IDE drive first. The default setting is IDE.

Configuration Table

This option displays the configuration table during boot-up. The configuration table shows a summary of information concerning your system hardware configuration. The default setting is Disabled.

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2.4 System Security

The Setup program has a number of security features to prevent unauthorized access to the system and its data.

2.4.1 Disk Drive Control

The disk drive control features allow you to control the floppy drive or the hard disk drive boot function to prevent loading operating systems or other programs from a certain drive while the other drives are operational (under DOS mode only).

2.4.2 Setup Password

The Setup Password prevents unauthorized access to the BIOS utility.

Setting a Password

1. Make sure that JP10 is set to 2–3 (bypass password).



You cannot enter the BIOS utility if a Setup password does not exist and JP10 is set to 1-2 (password check enabled).

By default, JP10 is set to 2-3 (bypass password).

2. Enter BIOS utility and select System Security.

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3. Highlight the Setup Password parameter and press the **↑** or **↓** key. The password prompt appears:



4. Type a password. The password may consist of up to seven characters.



Be very careful when typing your password because the characters do not appear on the screen.

5. Press ENTER. A prompt asks you to retype the password to verify your first entry.

6. Retype the password then press ENTER.

After setting the password, the system automatically sets the Setup Password parameter to Present.

- 7. Press Esc to exit the System Security screen and return to the Main menu.
- 8. Press 📧 to exit the BIOS utility. A dialog box appears asking if you want to save the CMOS data.
- 9. Select Yes to save the changes and reboot the system.
- 10. While rebooting, turn off the system then open the housing.
- 11. Set JP10 to 1-2 to enable the password function.

The next time you want to enter the BIOS utility, you must key in your Setup password.

Changing or Removing the Setup Password

Should you want to change your setup password, do the following:

- 1. Enter the BIOS utility and select System Security.
- 2. Highlight the Setup Password parameter.
- 3. Press ← or → to display the password prompt and key in a new password.

or

Press \leftarrow or \rightarrow and select None to remove the existing password.

- 4. Press Esc to exit the System Security screen and return to the Main menu.
- 5. Press ESC to exit the BIOS utility. A dialog box appears asking if you want to save the CMOS data.
- 6. Select Yes to save the changes.

Bypassing the Setup Password

If you forget your setup password, you can bypass the password security feature by hardware. Follow these steps to bypass the password:

- 1. Turn off and unplug the system.
- 2. Open the system housing and JP10 is set to 2–3 to bypass the password function.
- 3. Turn on the system and enter the BIOS utility. This time, the system does not require you to type in a password.

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You can either change the existing Setup password or remove it by selecting *None*. Refer to the previous section for the procedure.

2.4.3 Power On Password

The Power On Password secures your system against unauthorized use. Once you set this password, you have to type it whenever you boot the system. To set this password, enter the BIOS utility, select System Security, then highlight the Power On Password parameter. Follow the same procedure as in setting the Setup password.



Make sure to set JP10 to 1-2 to enable the Power On password.

Operation Mode

This function lets you enable or disable the password prompt display. When set to Normal, the password prompt appears before system boot. When set to Keyboard Lock, the password prompt do not appear; however, the keyboard will be locked after system boot and will remain locked until the correct password is entered.

2.5.1 Power Management Mode

This parameter allows you to reduce power consumption. When this parameter is set to Enabled, you can configure the IDE hard disk and system timers. Setting to Disabled deactivates the power-management feature and all the timers.

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IDE Hard Disk Standby Timer

This parameter allows the hard disk to enter standby mode after inactivity of 1 to 15 minutes, depending on your setting. When you access the hard disk again, allow 3 to 5 seconds (depending on the hard disk) for the disk to return to normal speed. Set this parameter to OFF if your hard disk does not support this function.

System Sleep Timer

This parameter sets the system to the lowest power-saving mode after a specified period of inactivity. Any keyboard or mouse action or any activity detected from the IRQ channels resume system operation.

SLEEP MODE

This parameter lets you specify the power-saving mode that the system will enter after a specified period of inactivity. The options are Standby and Suspend Mode. This parameter becomes configurable only if the System Sleep Timer is enabled. Any keyboard or mouse action, or any enabled monitored activities occurring through the IRQ channels resume system operation.

2.5.2 Power Switch < 4 sec.

When set to <code>Power-off</code>, the system automatically turns off when the power switch is pressed. When set to <code>Suspend</code>, the system enters the suspend mode.

2.5.3 ACPI BIOS

ACPI (Advanced Configuration and Power Interface) enables the operating system to control the amount of power given to each device attached to the computer. Using the OS (Operating System), ACPI can turn off peripheral devices , such as a CD-ROM drivers, when they're not in use. The default setting is Enabled.

2.5.4 System Wake-up Event

The system wake-up event allows the system to resume operation when the modem ring indicator is enabled.

Modem Ring Indicator

When Enabled any fax/modem activity wake-up the system from suspend mode. The default setting is Enabled.

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2.6 Advanced Configuration

The Advanced Configuration option allows you to configure the advanced system memory functions.



To avoid damaging the system, do not change any settings in the Advanced Configuration if you are not a qualified technician.

2.6.1 Internal Cache

This parameter enables or disables the first-level or internal memory, that is, the memory integrated into the CPU. The default setting is Enabled.

2.6.2 External Cache

This parameter enables or disables the external cache memory. The external cache is incorporated in the CPU module.

2.6.3 Memory at 15MB-16MB Reserved For

To prevent memory address conflicts between the system and expansion boards, reserve this memory range for the use of either the system or an expansion board.

2.6.4 C8000h - DFFFF Shadow

The system reserves a portion of random access memory (RAM) for the shadow RAM function. This parameter allows you to shadow the C8000h-DFFFF address range, enabling I/O ROM functions to run directly from the shadow RAM for faster operation. When you set this parameter to Disabled, the functions run normally from ROM.

2.6.5 Onboard Peripheral Configuration

The Onboard Peripheral Configuration allows you to configure the onboard communication ports and the onboard devices. Selecting this option from the Advanced Configuration menu displays the following screen:

Floppy Disk Controller

This parameter lets you enable or disable the onboard floppy disk controller.

IDE Controller

Set this parameter to Primary to enable only the primary IDE controller; Both to enable both primary and secondary IDE controller; or Disabled to disable all IDE controllers.

PS/2 Mouse Controller

This parameter enables or disables the onboard PS/2 mouse controller.

USB Host Controller

This parameter lets you enable or disable the USB controller on board. When enabled, it activates the USB function of the system. When disabled, it also deactivates the function.

BIOS Utility

USB LEGACY MODE

This function, when enabled, lets you use a USB keyboard in DOS environment. Set this to Disabled to deactivate the USB keyboard function in DOS environment.

Onboard Serial/Parallel Port Settings

The Onboard Serial/Parallel Port Settings menu allows you to configure the onboard communication ports and the onboard devices. Selecting this option from the Onboard Peripheral Configuration menu displays the following screen:

IRQ

This function lets you assign an interrupt for serial port 1 and 2. The options for serial port 1 are IRQ 4 and 11. The option for serial port 2 are IRQ 3 and 10.



The Base Address and IRQ parameters are configurable only if Serial Port 1 and/or 2 is enabled.

PARALLEL PORT

This parameter allows you to enable or disable the parallel port.

Base Address

This function lets you set a logical base address for the parallel port. The options are:

• 3BCh • 378h • 278h

IRQ

This function lets you assign an interrupt for the parallel port. The options are IRQ 5 and 7.



The Base Address and IRQ parameters are configurable only if Parallel Port is enabled.

If you install an add-on card that has a parallel port whose address conflicts with the parallel port onboard, a warning appears on the screen.

Check the parallel port address on the add-on card and change the address to one that does not conflict.

Operation Mode

This item allows you to set the operation mode of the parallel port. Table 2-2 lists the different operation modes.

ECP DMA Channel

The PnP/PCI System Configuration allows you to specify the settings for your PCI devices. Selecting this option displays the following screen:

PCI IRQ Setting

Select Auto to let BIOS automatically configure the plug-and-play (PnP) devices installed on your system. Otherwise, select Manual.



Refer to your manual for technical information about the PCI card.

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PCI SLOTS

When you set the PCI IRQ Setting parameter to Auto, these parameters specify the auto-assigned interrupt for each of the PCI devices. If you set the PCI IRQ Setting parameter to Manual, you need to specify the interrupt that you want to assign for each PCI device installed in your system.

PCI IRQ Sharing

Setting this parameter to Yes allows you to assign the same IRQ to two different devices. To disable the feature, select No.



If there are no IRQs available to assign for the remaining device function, we recommend that you enable this parameter.

VGA Palette Snoop

This parameter permits you to use the palette snooping feature if you installed more than one VGA card in the system.

The VGA palette snoop function allows the control palette register (CPR) to manage and update the VGA RAM DAC (Digital Analog Converter, a color data storage) of each VGA card installed in the system. The snooping process lets the CPR send a signal to all the VGA cards so that they can update their individual RAM DACs. The signal goes through the cards continuously until all RAM DAC data have been updated. This allows display of multiple images on the screen.

Some VGA cards have required settings for this feature. Check your VGA card manual before setting this parameter.

BIOS Utility

Plug and Play OS

When this parameter is set to Yes, BIOS initializes only PnP boot devices such as SCSI cards. When set to No, BIOS initializes all PnP boot and non-boot devices such as sound cards.



Set this parameter to Yes only if your operating system is Windows 95.

Reset Resource Assignments

Set this parameter to Yes to avoid IRQ conflict when installing non-PnP or PnP ISA cards. This clears all resource assignments and allows BIOS to reassign resources to all installed PnP devices the next time the system boots. After clearing the resource data, the parameter resets to N_O .

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2.7 Exit Setup Utility

To exit the BIOS utility, select Exit Setup Utility from the Main menu. The following screen appears:

2.7.1 Save CMOS Settings and Exit

Select this option if you want to save the current CMOS settings and exit the BIOS utility.

2.7.2 Load Previous Settings and Exit

Select this option to cancel the current changes made to the BIOS settings, reload the previous settings and exit the BIOS utility after reload.

2.7.3 Load Default Settings

This option loads the default settings for the optimized system configuration. Press \boxed{ESC} to return to the Main menu.

2.7.4 Save CMOS Settings

Select this option to save the current BIOS settings, including your recent modifications. Press \boxed{ESC} to return to the Main Menu.

2.7.5 Abort Settings Change

This option cancels all modifications that you have made in the system configuration and reloads your previous settings. Press $\boxed{\texttt{ESC}}$ to return to the Main Menu.

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
